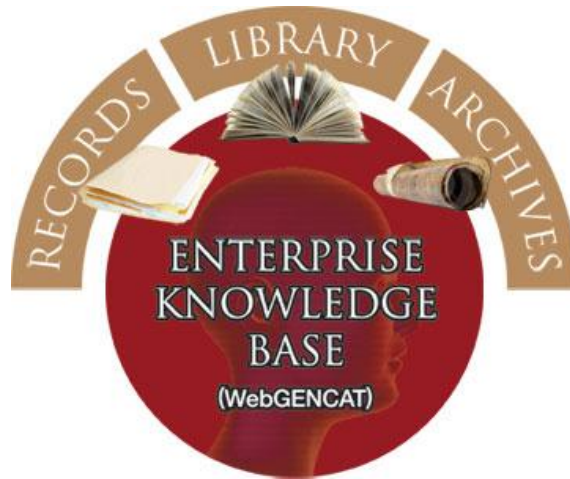

The author of *Creating Memory: A Guide to Outdoor Public Sculpture in Toronto* (2010) will draw upon more than five decades of research into Canada's cultural and historical geography to explore the relationship between public monuments and the commemoration of conflict.

Anna St. Onge will discuss issues that emerged when the fonds of men who served in the American, German, and Soviet armies during World War II complicated discourse on the themes of service, sacrifice, and triumph when used in a virtual exhibit to commemorate Remembrance Day.
