

GREETINGS FROM UOIT

Welcome to the University of Ontario Institute of Technology! We're glad to have you on campus. While you are here I encourage you take the opportunity to tour the library (and archives!). As you walk around our campus you'll notice it is shared between Durham College and UOIT, with the Library, Ice Arena, Tennis Centre, Food Service, and several other departments serving students of both institutions every day.

Although UOIT is only ten years old, enrollment has grown dramatically and is expected to be in the range of 10,000 undergraduate and 500 graduate students this September. Add to that the 10,000 students of Durham College and it makes for a VERY busy campus throughout the academic year.

The Library and archives collections at UOIT have been developed with technology and our Science/ Engineering subject specialties in mind. With 90% of our book, periodical, and media collections in digital format, students can access these resources from their laptop computers from anywhere, anytime. An information kiosk, rfid security system, Smartboards, wi-fi access, digital message boards, and over 150 computers are available in the library for student use. In addition to archiving both print and digital materials about the university and college, the major archival collections already established include the official records of several national engineering societies. 

The James Bay Treaty, also known as Treaty 9, was created in 1905 on seven parchment pages and has been defining the relationship between northern Ontario and the government for the past 110 years. Paul McIlroy, senior archivist, will describe the significance of the Treaty to the province and the Cree Nation and will discuss the impact that the document has had on past and current events. Shannon Coles, conservator, will discuss how archival records are made available for loan to external institutions through conservation and preservation efforts. 
